Effective Date: The bill was deemed lost in the House on May 9, 2012, when the General Assembly adjourned sine die without taking final action.

Summary of Legislation

This bill removes the \$5,000 annual cap that a county can request from a property owner in reimbursement for control of a pest infestation or infection on private property. The bill also authorizes county pest inspectors to exercise the same powers granted counties to control noxious weeds, rodents and predatory animals.

Local Government Impact

The fiscal impact of the bill depends on the choices made by counties and cannot be determined. Counties that choose to have a pest control program design their programs. As a result, pest control programs vary across the state meaning that the impact of Senate Bill 12-169 will vary by county. Possible impacts include a county increasing the amount of land treated or a county recovering more of their costs for the pest control treatment they are already performing. For counties without pest control programs, the bill may encourage them to adopt programs or may have no fiscal impact.
