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A BILL FOR AN ACT

101 CONCERNING EMERGENCY SUPPLIES FOR COLORADO BABIES AND  
102 FAMILIES, AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, PROVIDING  
103 DIAPERING ESSENTIALS THROUGH DIAPER DISTRIBUTION  
104 CENTERS AND MAKING AN APPROPRIATION.

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Bill Summary

The bill requires the department of public health and environment to select one or more nonprofit organizations to administer diaper distribution centers that provide diapering essentials to eligible

individuals. Diapering essentials must be made available to all Colorado residents.

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1 *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Colorado:*

2 **SECTION 1. Legislative declaration.** (1) The general assembly  
3 finds and declares that:

4 (a) Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, one in three families  
5 reported needing more diapering essentials and with unprecedented  
6 unemployment rates due to the pandemic, this need is drastically higher.  
7 With 202,608 children under the age of three in Colorado, 67,536 of them  
8 experienced the negative effects of diapering-essential needs.

9 (b) The National Diaper Bank Network has seen the demand for  
10 diapering essentials increase by as much as 300 percent in some areas of  
11 the country and Colorado diaper banks report seeing four times the need  
12 for diapering essentials due to the COVID-19 pandemic's impacts on  
13 families;

14 (c) Thirty-five percent of Coloradans reported finding it difficult  
15 or somewhat difficult to pay for basic necessities after the COVID-19  
16 pandemic began, and parents are having to cut back on necessities such  
17 as food and rent in order to afford diapering essentials;

18 (d) According to the National Diaper Bank Network, it costs at  
19 least \$80 a month to diaper a child and diapering essentials cannot be  
20 purchased through other public assistance programs such as the  
21 supplemental nutrition assistance program or the women, infants, and  
22 children program. Diaper banks' distribution of diapers to low-income  
23 families is associated with increases in the personal income of recipients,  
24 the elimination of medical expenses, and increases in state tax revenue.

25 (e) Parents report reusing disposable diapers, plastic bags, and

1 toilet paper when they run out of money for diapering essentials, leading  
2 to painful diaper rash and health complications for children; and

3 (f) An adequate supply of diapers may prove to be a tangible way  
4 of reducing parenting stress, which is a critical factor that influences child  
5 health and development.

6 (2) Therefore, the general assembly finds and declares that it is  
7 imperative to provide emergency diapering essentials to Colorado babies  
8 and families in need.

9 **SECTION 2.** In Colorado Revised Statutes, **add** article 56 to title  
10 25 as follows:

11 **ARTICLE 56**

12 **Diapering Essentials Provided Through**  
13 **Diaper Distribution Centers**

14 **25-56-101. Definitions.** AS USED IN THIS ARTICLE 56, UNLESS THE  
15 CONTEXT OTHERWISE REQUIRES:

16 (1) "DEPARTMENT" MEANS THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH  
17 AND ENVIRONMENT.

18 (2) "DIAPERING ESSENTIALS" INCLUDES DIAPERS, WIPES, AND  
19 DIAPER CREAMS.

20 (3) "ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUAL" MEANS A PERSON THE DIAPER  
21 DISTRIBUTION CENTER DETERMINES IS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE DIAPERING  
22 ESSENTIALS.

23 **25-56-102. Diapering essentials - diaper distribution center -**  
24 **rules - repeal.** (1) NO LATER THAN FORTY-FIVE DAYS AFTER THE  
25 EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS SECTION, THE DEPARTMENT SHALL SELECT ONE  
26 OR MORE NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS TO ADMINISTER DIAPER  
27 DISTRIBUTION CENTERS THAT PROVIDE DIAPERING ESSENTIALS TO ELIGIBLE

1 INDIVIDUALS. THE DIAPER DISTRIBUTION CENTERS SHALL BE OPERATIONAL  
2 NO LATER THAN SIXTY DAYS AFTER THE DEPARTMENT'S SELECTION OF THE  
3 NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL SELECT ENOUGH  
4 NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS TO ENSURE DIAPERING ESSENTIALS ARE  
5 AVAILABLE TO ALL ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUALS RESIDING IN COLORADO. THE  
6 SELECTION PROCESS DESCRIBED IN THIS SUBSECTION (1) IS NOT SUBJECT  
7 TO THE "PROCUREMENT CODE", ARTICLES 101 TO 112 OF TITLE 24.

8 (2) THE DEPARTMENT MAY PROMULGATE RULES FOR THE  
9 IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS ARTICLE 56.

10 (3) BEGINNING IN STATE FISCAL YEAR 2022-23, THE DEPARTMENT  
11 SHALL SUBMIT A REPORT TO THE PUBLIC THROUGH THE ANNUAL HEARING,  
12 PURSUANT TO THE "STATE MEASUREMENT FOR ACCOUNTABLE,  
13 RESPONSIVE, AND TRANSPARENT (SMART) GOVERNMENT ACT", PART 2  
14 OF ARTICLE 7 OF TITLE 2. AT A MINIMUM, THE REPORT MUST INCLUDE:

15 (a) THE TOTAL NUMBER OF NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS RECEIVING  
16 MONEY TO OPERATE DIAPER DISTRIBUTION CENTERS;

17 (b) THE LOCATION OF EACH DIAPER DISTRIBUTION CENTER; AND

18 (c) THE TOTAL NUMBER OF ELIGIBLE INDIVIDUALS THAT RECEIVED  
19 DIAPERING ESSENTIALS.

20 (4) (a) FOR STATE FISCAL YEARS 2021-22 AND 2022-23, THE  
21 GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHALL APPROPRIATE TWO MILLION DOLLARS FROM  
22 THE GENERAL FUND TO THE DEPARTMENT FOR USE BY THE DIAPER  
23 DISTRIBUTION CENTERS FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THIS ARTICLE 56.

24 (b) THIS SUBSECTION (4) IS REPEALED, EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2024.

25 **SECTION 3. Safety clause.** The general assembly hereby finds,  
26 determines, and declares that this act is necessary for the immediate  
27 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety.
