**Effective Date:** The bill was deemed lost in the House of Representatives on May 9, 2012, when the General Assembly adjourned sine die without taking final action.

# **Summary of Legislation**

This bill creates the Colorado Conservation special license plate. The plate will be available to all applicants who pay a one-time additional fee of \$50 and demonstrate they have donated \$50 to the Three Rivers Alliance. Of the fee, \$25 is credited to the Licensing Services Cash Fund (LSCF) and \$25 is credited to the Highway Users Tax Fund (HUTF).

### **State Revenue**

This bill is anticipated to increase state cash fund revenue by up to \$167,760 in FY 2012-13 and \$27,960 in FY 2013-14. Table 1 displays revenue generated by fiscal year.

Revenue is generated from the plate and tab production fee of \$5.92 per plate set, credited to the License Plate Cash Fund, which all vehicle owners must pay upon registration. Applicants for the Colorado Conservation plate are also required to pay an additional \$50 fee; of this, \$25 is credited to the Highway Users Tax Fund and \$25 is credited to the Licensing Services Cash Fund. The Department of Revenue (DOR) may begin issuing the plate on January 1, 2013, upon completion of design and administrative preparations. This fiscal note assumes the DOR will issue 3,000 plate sets in FY 2012-13, and 500 plate sets in FY 2013-14.

State Highway Fund. This bill increases State Highway Fund revenue by an estimated \$48,750 in FY 2012-13 and \$8,125 in FY 2013-14. Since this bill is expected to increase HUTF revenue by \$75,000 in FY 2012-13, and \$12,500 in FY 2013-14, the State Highway Fund is increased accordingly. HUTF revenue generated by license plate fees is distributed to the State Highway Fund (65 percent), counties (26 percent) and municipalities (9 percent) for transportation.

# **State Expenditures**

State expenditures will increase by \$20,720 in FY 2012-13 and \$2,960 in FY 2013-14. Table 2 shows the costs required to implement the bill.

In FY 2012-13, one-time computer programming costs of \$2,960 are required to update the Colorado State Titling and Registration System (CSTARS). Plate and tab production costs are expended from the LPCF. Based on expected demand for the new plate, an initial run of 3,000 plate sets will be necessary. The plate will be designed by Three Rivers Alliance, and therefore the DOR will not incur design costs of \$200.

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# **Local Government Impact**

The bill increases county and municipal government revenue by an estimated \$26,250 in FY 2012-13 and \$4,375 in FY 2013-14. Since this bill is expected to increase HUTF revenue by \$75,000 in FY 2012-13, and \$12,500 in FY 2013-14, county and other local distributions are increased accordingly. HUTF revenue generated by license plate fees is distributed to the State Highway Fund (65 percent), counties (26 percent) and municipalities (9 percent) for transportation.

# **State Appropriations**

For FY 2012-13, the DOR requires two cash fund appropriations — \$17,760 from the License Plate Cash Fund, and \$2,960 from the HUTF CSTAR Account. In addition, the Governor's Office of Information Technology requires spending authority for \$2,960 in reappropriated funds.
